April 2016

Meet at the Nature Center unless otherwise noted.

- Sun. April 3** **Peninsula Trail Hike, 11am.** Meet at the Peninsula Trailhead for a brisk 3-mile hike. Hiking footwear and weather appropriate clothing recommended
- Sat. April 9** **Furnace Wildlife Hike, 2pm.** Meet at the Hope Furnace parking lot for a short wildlife and nature hike.

- Sat. April 16** **How to know the Wildflowers, 2pm.** Learn basic wildflower identification skills such as how to use keys, helpful tips and tricks, and basic botany terms and plant anatomy. NOT a wildflower hike.
- Sun. April 17** **Moonville Mystery & History, 11am.** Caravan from the Nature Center to Moonville Tunnel to learn some interesting facts about this unique local landmark. Hike is weather dependent. Hiking appropriate clothing and footwear recommended.
- Sat. April 23** **Annual Lake Hope Wildflower Walk, 11am.** Caravan from the Nature Center to various wildflower hotspots throughout the park and Zaleski state forest to see some of Ohio's woodland wonders.
- Sat. April 23** **Owl Prowl and Night Hike, 8pm.** Meet at the Hope Furnace parking lot to search and listen for these nocturnal predators. Hike is weather dependent.
- Sat. April 30** **Naturalist's Choice, 2pm.** Stop by the lobby of the Lake Hope Dining Lodge and visit with the naturalist, learn about some curious critters, fascinating fossils, or peculiar plants.
